Thus far, 2009 has been a very busy year. Training Counselors have trained 5,000 new instructors during the first two quarters, surpassing 61,000 total. Instructors have been conducting a lot of Pistol, Personal Protection In The Home, and Home

Firearm Safety training. In the first six months of this year alone, training material sales have exceed-d the entire 2007 sales.

We can speculate all day about the reasons for

this incredible growth, but the facts are gun sales are up, ammunition has virtually disappeared from many parts of the country, and training is in great demand. With these facts in mind, I implore you to not let the staggering increase in demand lure any of us into relaxing our standards and taking short cuts for the sake of a quick buck. Both the NRA's and your reputations are on the line. 'Nuff said!

Under the direction of the BSA National Shooting Sports Taskforce, the

NRA's Youth Programs Department is responsible for reviewing, updating and rewriting all safety and training materials related to the BSA's shooting sports programs. The goal of the shooting sports rewrite project is to make a seamless progression through all three

levels of Scouting, from Cub Scouts through Boy Scouts to Venturing Programs.

The Camp Program continues to grow, with 125 Shooting Camps registered this year. Instructors,

coaches and other volunteers are doing a great job. One camp, open to both adults and youth, reported 577 participants in several of its programs. The Illinois "NRA Day" had 1,600 attendees enjoy their various shooting activities as well as vendor displays. Participation in the National High School Rodeo Association events was a stellar success, with an increase of 137% over last year. New Mexico was the setting for both age divisions. The junior high school Wrangler Division event's rifle

event was held in Gallup, while the Senior Division's rifle and trap events were held in Farmington. Both events featured a Family Day with rifle and trap events for both youths and adults.

The two advanced junior shotgun camps were at full capacity as was the advanced junior smallbore camp. The intermediate junior pistol camp at Camp Perry continues to grow steadily, while the intermediate junior smallbore camp there again had a waiting list. The volunteer staffs of those camps are to be commended for their superb efforts.

The Youth Hunter Education Challenge (YHEC) at the NRA Whittington Center at Raton, New Mexico, with 380 participants, was the third largest in the YHEC's 24-year history. The volunteer staff of 137 conducted an outstanding program featuring shooting events in smallbore, rifle, shotgun, muzzleloading rifle, and archery. The participants also took part in outdoor responsibility events: wildlife identification, orienteering, a Hunter Safety Trail, and a Hunter Safety Responsibility exam. They also participated in several dif-

Letter to NRA Trainers

s promised in the Training Counselor Christmas letter, we've been able to get out and visit several NRA training courses being advertised on the NRA Website. We have noticed some interesting things that I'd like to address. We've provided PowerPoint® presentations to use in conducting TC workshops as well as instructor training courses. We did not notice trainers taking advantage of these great training aids. At the TC workshop level, using the computer presentation is imperative. If you do not have a laptop and projector or flat screen TV at your disposal, consider renting them and using them in your workshop; this is an expense that is easily passed on in your course fees. Remember, the training these candidates receive from you is going to be reflected in the way they present our courses to basic students in the future. As we update the program, all new lesson plans will have a CD presentation packaged with them. We recently re-Leased the new Pistol Course, with new dtudent Packets (which include the new NRA Guide to the Basics of Pistol Shooting) and new lesson plans which include the PowerPoint® presentation.

Another area we would like to address involves Instructor Candidate selection. Not everyone who attends an NRA Instructor Course is qualified for

certification as an instructor; this applies to TC workshops, as well. Paying the fee does

not guarantee successful completion. It is important for Training Counselors to review the requirements and uphold the standard that NRA Certified Instructors are EXPERIENCED in the discipline they wish to become certified in. Utilize the pre-course assessment and make an honest determination as to their ability to represent NRA by conducting basic courses effectively to not only those that have never handled a firearm before but, also, those who seek training to help them get their concealed carry permits. Think back to your TC workshop in the lesson on effective evaluations: it clearly states to retrain, reevaluate, redirect, or, some-

times, reject candidates. Only those who have demonstrated that they are fully qualified should be recommended for the certified rating. Those who

do not have the experience necessary may be recommended for the assistant rating. There are a LOT of "gun guys and gals" who attend NRA basic courses and Personal Protection courses just to get that certificate. NRA Certi-Instructors

are often an individual's first exposure to NRA, and people have a very high expectation of anyone bearing the title, "NRA Certified." Let's work together to ensure that tradition remains solid.

I'd like to share with you my FIRST exposure to an NRA Certified Instructor. In 1995, the state that I resided in went to "Shall Issue." One of the requirements was to attend the state's required training course. My buddy and I, both active duty military and bona fide "gun guys," attended the course together. The instructor had NRA Certified Instructor patches on his clothing and used posters and training aids

> identified NRA materials. We were impressed. Both of us were NRA members

but had no idea NRA had an Instructor certification program. We enjoyed the course; however, during the instructor's presentation, he gave out gravely incorrect information. When we questioned him, he was obviously not confident in his response, and he told us he'd discuss it on break. We never brought up the questions again, but he immediately lost credibility in our eyes. We just wanted that piece of

This brings up my point. Here I am, nearly 15 years later, retired from the military and in a position that at that time long ago I could have never imagined. One of my responsibilities to is to

review and respond to the many letters that we receive identifying trainers that are "attempting" to conduct NRA courses or representing NRA - in their

> attire, advertisements and such - with very little actual experience as a "gun gal or guy." You would not believe some of the reports we receive, from definitions of a single action revolver, shooting stances, using air guns, description of calibers, teach-

ing the LAW in FIRST Steps, to name a few! Remember, experienced individuals and new shooters seek training equally. Fortunately for us, a lot of these folks go home from their course and send us a nice (or not so nice) letter or e-mail identifying the misinformation that was taught in their classes.

NRA Certified Instructors should "walk the talk." When we send out instructor lists or make recommendations to those seeking training we need to be able to do so in confidence, knowing that individuals can contact you and receive quality training. NRA Instructors should seek additional training courses, attend as many firearms related courses as possible, read all the latest magazines and books and stay on top of what is happening in the firearms industry.

In closing, this year will lead to the introduction of many new concepts. We are now completely online and provide instructors with the means to do all their student management, advertising and course reporting online. Faxed, email and paper course reports will no longer be accepted, as the means to do so is provided through NRA instructors' personal website, www.nrainstructors.org. Hope to see you around.

New www.nrainstructors.org Website Up and Running

fter a small group of very active NRA trainers were selected to help NRA evaluate the new www.nrainstructors.org and offer their input, suggestions and results, this newest NRA Education & Training tool is now up and running. We have been working very hard on this project, and are very excited about its release. This website is now the only avenue for trainers to advertise courses on the NRA website and report their training (no more paper!!). It provides your

own customer management database, and potential students will have better search options to find your courses.

Log on at www.nrainstructors.org. You'll be required to enter your ID number and Zip Code to get in; then you can create your own unique ID and password. A user guide is available once you register. After registering, you will be able to schedule your courses and decide whether or not you want the course to be visible on line.

Advantages include: Free advertisement for your courses, automate course reporting, and your own customer management database in a secure web based environment. Your tool to advertise current courses and market your future courses to prior students as well as prospects. Welcome to the 21st Century!

NRAInstructors.org is required for NRA certified Instructors to register and advertise courses, as well as report training to NRA. After registration, NRA Instructors can login to their own secure area where they will be able to:

- 1. Register/advertise new courses.
- 2. Add and manage assistant instructors for courses.
- 3. Register and manage students for courses.
- 4. View and submit all course reports to NRA, including BSA, 4-H, Hunter Ed and Others!
- 5. View course training materials and purchase them.

Your information is secure and will not be utilized in any way, unless you students or you click the "share information" box in the student registration area.

NRA will be able to create awards based on instructor activity and pull reports such as numbers of students attending each specific discipline for future firearms training program development. NRA will be able to keep instructors up-to-date with the latest tools available.

THE LONG-TERM (BUT NOT TOO LONG) GOAL IS THAT THIS WILL BE THE ONLY WAY THAT COURSE REPORTS WILL BE ACCEPTED.

At that point, e-mailed, faxed and mailed course reports will NO LON-GER BE ACCEPTED.






2010 NRA Great American Hunting & Outdoor Show

Dear Elizabeth Hellmann:



Regional Counselor may train individuals to be Refuse To Be A Victim® Instructors. Refuse To Be A Victim® Instructors teach Refuse To Be A Victim® Seminars to the public.

This non-shooting, non-firearms seminar reaches an audience you may not normally meet in your other NRA courses. Seminar attendees learn about many types of personal protection devices which can include a firearm. They also learn that the National Rifle Association supports their right to select a firearm as a part of their personal safety options if they so choose. The Training Department regrets to inform you that to date:

Two NRA Training Counselors have had their credentials revoked, four Training Counselors have been placed on probation, and five have had their credentials suspended.

Twenty-five Certified Instructors have had their credentials suspended, with four being revoked.

These actions were taken for various violations: ethical issues; not following lesson plans; safety violations; failure to use appropriate disclaimer for non-NRA courses; and intellectual property violations for making copies of NRA certificates.

NRA Honors Four Women

The National Rifle Association is proud to announce the 2009 winners of the Sybil Ludington Women's Freedom and Marion P. Hammer Woman of Distinction Awards.

These awards recognize the exceptional accomplishments of modern heroines through their legislative activism, volunteerism, and educational contributions to advancing the purposes and goals of the NRA. On a national level, the Sybil Ludington Women's Freedom Award is named after a heroine of the American Revolution. The Marion P. Hammer Woman of Distinction Award is named for the first female president of the NRA and recognizes the achievements of women

who have worked at the local, state, or regional levels to promote the shooting sports and defend the Second Amendment.

Linda Walker of Alexandria, Ohio received the Sybil Ludington Women's Freedom Award. Marion P. Hammer Woman of Distinction Awards were presented to: Susan Bierly of Stewart-ville, Minnesota; Marlene Duncan of Lake Havasu City, Arizona; and Donna Vandermolen of Conroe, Texas.



Upgrading To A Progressive Shotshell Reloader

t usually isn't long after shotgunners begin to shoot trap, skeet, or Lsporting clays that they consider reloading their own ammunition. The advantages of reloading become more obvious to them once they start shooting their new sport in earnest. A little math quickly confirms the economic advantage over shooting new shells. Some want to reduce their shooting costs, but most opt to reload so they can shoot a lot more on the same shooting budget.

Those new to shotshell reloading usually start with a single-stage reloader, such as a MEC 600 Jr. This particular model has outsold all other shotshell reloaders for over three decades and is very reliable and easy to operate. The only significant draw-back to a singlestage loader is that the operator loads one shell at a time and must move the shell and pull the machine's handle five times to complete each reload before removing the finished shell from the unit. For those who wish to reload only to hunt and/or shoot a few rounds of clay targets each year, this is no particular concern, and the modest cost of the equipment is easily justifiable.

Once a clay target shooter begins to shoot frequently and shoots a lot, the move to a progressive reloader becomes appealing. The progressive reloader, such as the MEC 9000GN, completes separate reloading functions on six shells simultaneously with each pull of

the handle. The operator just inserts an empty hull and plastic wad, moves the handle down and up, and a reloaded shell is gently ejected from the machine down a convenient slide tray. A full box of 25 shells is easily reloaded in 5-6 minutes. The operator just needs to be attentive that the shot and pow-

der supply bottles and the primer feed tray are refilled as needed. This reloader comes with an automatic primer feeder that holds up to 200 primers. The machine is a model of efficiency. It can even

be operated as a single-stage loader, which is particularly useful when first becoming familiar with its operation. Of course, progressive reloaders cost more than the single-stage models, but everyone knows what his or her personal time is worth and how much time they are willing to devote to reloading. It's pretty nice to crank out a hundred shells in 20 minutes, or less!

For those who reload for multiple shooters, such as family members or a team of junior shooters, even the handle-operated progressive can become quite a bit of physical work. And, there are those shooters with physical limitations who find repeatedly pulling a re-

> loader handle beyond their ability or comfortlevel.MEC comes to their rescue with powertwo assist options that have been adapted to the 9000GN machine. One is hydraulic, foot-operated unit (the 9000HN), and the other is an electric hand-

operated unit (the 9000E). The hydraulic machine creates more noise, but some prefer the foot control. The newly designed electric model is very quiet - a real advantage to those wishing to maintain domestic peace and tranquility. The only sound is the action of the reloader itself and a mild electric motor

> hum heard only when the reloading operations are being performed. Rather than pulling a handle, the simply operator simultaneously presses two separated thumb-buttons on the electric Auto-Mate base


(which also safely keeps the hands away from the moving parts of the reloader). When the loader reaches the bottom of its stroke, a green light signals the operator to release the thumb buttons. The reloader then returns to the top of its stroke, and another shell is completed and ejected.

The power-assist progressives also offer the advantage of highly consistent operation which produces very uniform reloads. With the installation of an inexpensive linkage kit, existing 9000GN loaders in different gauges can share the same Auto-Mate electric base. Changing loaders on the base can be done in less than four minutes.

If you do a lot of shotshell reloading and would like to spend less time doing it, treat yourself to a progressive reloader. If you want to reduce the physical effort to a bare minimum, a power-assisted reloader is worthy of your serious consideration.

As a final note, whatever equipment you use, always follow the manufacturer's owner's manual, and use only current loading data published by shotshell component manufacturers or other reliable sources. Shoot well, and shoot often!
