The Importance of Hearing Protection

It's no secret that the blast of a firearm can be damaging to your hearing. In fact at 140+ decibels (dB), it is one of the most dangerous sounds that you can expose your ears to. A single exposure to a noise of that magnitude can instantly cause acoustic trauma, or sudden noise-induced hearing loss. This hearing loss occurs because tiny hair cells that make up the cochlea, the end organ of hearing, become damaged and are no longer able to function properly. The function of these hair cells is to convert sound into electrical energy or nerve impulses that are sent to the brain. When the brain no longer receives the nerve impulses, hearing loss has occurred. In he case of an acoustic trauma, this damage is irreversible. Repeated exposure makes the hearing loss even greater.

Hearing loss has multiple dimensions. The most obvious is when sounds become more difficult to detect. This is the impact of the shift in hearing thresholds. Your hearing threshold is the quietest level that you can detect a sound. The aspect of hearing loss that is less obvious to detect without a hearing test, but has an equally debilitating impact, is a change in the quality of sounds, especially speech. This can be the result of hair cells that may have been damaged, but not destroyed. The signals that are sent to the brain from damaged hair cells is distortion. For some people, hearing loss just means that it is harder to hear. For others, not only is it harder to hear, but on top of that it is difficult to clearly understand speech.

Hearing loss that is caused by firearms is preventable through the use of hearing protection. There are several different types of hearing protection devices ranging from shooting muffs to foam ear plugs to customized electronic

protection. The key to a good hearing protection system is the Noise Reduction Rating (NRR). The NRR demonstrates the number of dB that are effectively prevented from reaching the ear drum when properly fit and worn. Some ear protection will boast an NRR of 30 dB or greater, while others may provide protection in the ranges of 16-20 dB NRR. Cotton balls are not recommended for use as hearing protection as the level of protection afforded is negligible.

While basic disposable ear plugs can cost pennies on the dollar, other more sophisticated devices can cost several hundreds of dollars and the options on the market seem endless. Choice of hearing protection can be dictated by many factors including size, comfort, cost, personal preference and ease of use. Many devices today are available with electronic circuitry such as external microphones, amplifiers, and receivers (miniature

loudspeakers). Such devices allow you to hear your environment and at the same time prevent the amplified sound from exceeding comfort levels. Most electronic devices will have features that actually attenuate or compress the loud signals.

Shooting educators have multiple obligations as it relates to hearing protection. The first and most important obligation is to set an example. Today it is relatively easy to lead by example in this manner, as most shooting venues require hearing protection. Next is educating shooters. Those new to shooting as well as seasoned shooters need to be educated and reminded on a regular basis of the importance of protecting your hearing. It's also important to teach why hearing protection is important. The impact of hearing loss is one that lasts a lifetime and can have a serious impact on one's quality of life.

Winchester Ammunition Sponsors the Marksmanship Qualification Program

mproving your skills with a firearm largely requires two Lthings: lots of practice and lots of ammunition. Winchester has provided the latter since 1866 and with a \$500,000 pledge to endow the NRA's Marksmanship Qualification Program, the company aims to make sure shooters continue their practice. The pledge, formally announced at this year's NRA Annual Meetings and Exhibits held in St. Louis, MO, makes Winchester the exclusive, permanent sponsor of the newly renamed Winchester/NRA Marksmanship Qualification Program.

Many shooting coaches and hunter education instructors consider

Marksmanship Qualification an indispensable way to incourage young people and beginning adult shooters to develop their shooting skills and grow their interest in the shooting sports.

The program can be self-administered or conducted by a club, instructor, or mentor on public, private or home ranges. It is designed to help shooters advance

from beginning skill levels up to the nationally recognized skill rating, Distinguished Expert. Shooters who attain the Distinguished Expert rating will have developed a proficiency level on par with that of a competitively classified Sharpshooter.

The qualification program offers patches for the various courses of fire and patch rockers, pins, medals, and certificates for each skill level as shooters achieve progressively higher marksmanship standards. More than 200,000 such awards were distributed in 2006, and 1,700 shooters reached the Distinguished Expert level.

Awards can be
obtained in 13
shooting disciplines, from
International Air
Pistol to Shotgun, to
High Power Rifle.

Winchester and the NRA have been national leaders of youth shooting education for generations. The original

NRA Marksmanship Qualification Program was based in part on a similar program begun by Winchester in



1918, known as the Winchester Junior Rifle Corps. Winchester transferred this program to the NRA in 1926, when it merged with the association's existing youth training offerings.

"Winchester and NRA cooperated on this program almost a century ago, and the need for us to cooperate again is stronger than ever," said Winchester Ammunition President Dick Hammett. "By supporting the Winchester/NRA Marksmanship Qualification Program, we are giving increasing numbers of American citizens, young and old, the chance to explore the profound benefits that hunting and the shooting sports have to offer.

As shooting instructors, in addition to setting the tone by wearing hearing protection in the first place, you should also be conscious of the need to monitor your surroundings in an instructional environment. For this reason, certain types of hearing protection are more advantageous han others. Specifically, electronic hearing protection devices will allow you to communicate in a normal fashion, giving you the ability to hear

range commands, student questions and other elements of your environment, while at the same time, giving you the necessary hearing protection from firearm blasts.

Just as your first firearm instructor may have shared his own experiences with you, you may have your own stories to share with your students as to how you have been impacted by the effects of not protecting your hearing while

shooting. Anyone who has hearing loss as a result of shooting or other noise exposure will attest that the impact of hearing loss on the ability to communicate in general translates to quality of life issues. Protect your own hearing and help others protect theirs by adding hearing protection education to your teaching toolbox.

Anyone from the states of MICHIGAN (effective as of August I, 2007) and ILLINOIS (effective as of September I) purchasing merchandise rom the NRA Program Materials Center will be charged state sales tax for that state.

Department of Natural Resources hunter education instructor. Since 1994, she has run Darnall's Youth Shooting Clinic, which attracts more



JROTC MARKSMANSHIP OUALIFICATION CHANGES


All levels of the JROTC Marksmanship Qualification Program will now be covered with the new JROTC Combined Certificate, except for the JROTC Distinguished Expert Certificate, which will remain separate. As a result, when you order the JROTC Pro-Marksman Packet (item # EQ 20003), you will now receive a Pro-Marksman Rocker, a Pro-Marksman Medal, and a JROTC Combined Certificate Kit, which includes the new JROTC Combined Certificate and *nine* Stickers.

The Combined Certificate is set up so that every level of the JROTC Qualification Program is listed on this one certificate, except for Distinguished Expert. Each level has the rating printed on the certificate with a circle located above it. You take one of the round stickers off of the sheet of nine that you will receive with your packet and place it on the circle that represents each level that you have obtained. As you continue to move up the level of award earned, you will place a sticker at that new level, all the way through Expert. Once you reach the Distinguished Expert level, a separate Distinguished Expert Packet is available for purchase which contains the new JROTC Distinguished Expert Certificate.

NOTE: For those JROTC units who have individuals that have already surpassed the Pro-Marksman level, but have not yet achieved the Distinguished Expert level, you will be able to obtain for a limited time, both the combination certificate and stickers on a no charge basis. These certificates and stickers will be sent to you directly from NRA HQ, not from the Program Materials Center in West

Virginia. Please note that you will still be responsible for purchasing from the Program Materials Center the Marksman, Sharpshooter and Expert Skill Level Packets to provide to your participants.


New Rockers for the Shotgun Qualification Program


Newly designed skeet, trap and sporting clays rockers are now used with the shotgun qualification patch to differentiate between the sports (see the accompanying photo).

Teaching a Class Soon?

Make Sure to Plan Ahead!

o all new and current trainers, are you getting ready to teach a class soon? Do you know what to do to avoid getting caught short of training materials? It is really very simple....plan ahead!

We cannot emphasize enough to allow 3 to 4 weeks for delivery of your training materials order *after* you have placed your order either online, by telephone, or by mail. In addition, plan to have your materials arrive at least two weeks prior to your course. So, start ordering five to six weeks in advance. If you are worried about additional persons signing up for your courses, order extra materials and keep them on hand. Sooner or later you are sure to use them, if not for this class then for another.

Why allow so much time? Occasionally we run into backorder situations. Even though we try very hard not to allow this to happen, Murphy's Law prevails. This is when timing is everything!

If you follow the guidelines listed above, you should not be without the materials you need for your scheduled class. There have been instances where trainers wait until the last minute and try to order their materials to be shipped by expedited services. If the materials are not available they cannot be shipped by any method. Don't put yourself and your students in a bind, order in plenty of time!

What happens if you order online? You need to allow 72 hours just for order processing in addition to shipping time. Again, if items are in backorder for any reason, you will not receive your order until the items are back in stock. Keep the five to six weeks time frame in mind even for

on-line orders. Orders logged into the order they were received. If you try to call the Program Materials Center in West Virgina and they cannot tell you exactly when your backorder will be shipped out, this is the reason. However, they will ship out your orders in a timely manner.

Why is it important to examine your shipment as soon as it arrives? In case something is incorrect with your order. This simple act will allow you enough time to contact the Program Materials Center and get the proper items sent to you in time for your class. This is where it is wise to have your materials arrive at least two weeks prior to your class.

We know you get tired of hearing this, but timing really is everything when it comes to ordering course materials. *Plan Ahead!*

Answers to the Trainer's Quiz

Take the NRA Trainer's Quiz on Page 2

- I. What eligibility prerequisites must one have to apply to become an NRA Training Counselor?

 ANSWER: You must have been an NRA Instructor for two years, and conducted five formal NRA courses totaling a minimum of 25 people, and you must have reported this training to the Education and Training Div.
- 2. Can I get a list of every NRA Instructor in my state?

ANSWER: No, NRA does not give out complete instructor lists; however, you may receive a list of several instructors who are closest to your zip code.

- 3. Does NRA Education and Training publish its employees phone numbers and email addresses?

 ANSWER: Yes, on the back of every NRA Certified instructor card there is a phone number for NRA Education and Training Programs. The NRA also puts the direct numbers and email addresses for each NRA program on the NRA's website. Phone numbers and email addresses can also be found in each issue of the training newsletter the Shooting Education Update.
- 4. I received a complaint from one of my students regarding another NRA instructor, what will the NRA do about this situation?

ANSWER: The NRA Training Department investigates each complaint on a case by case basis, and makes a decision as to the outcome on each case individually after a complete investigation. In order for the Training Department to conduct a full investigation, we must receive written first hand knowledge of the incident. The investigations, identities, outcomes, or revocations are kept completely confidential by the NRA Training Department.

5. I haven't taught an NRA course in a while, can I renew my credentials?

ANSWER: Yes, the NRA has a number of instructors who are deployed, re-located, or have extenuating circumstances; therefore, we allow instructors to renew. If you have questions regarding your renewal, please contact the credentials department at (703) 267-1420 or (703) 267-1427.
